NARRATIVE REPORT

My career aspirations are best described by the scientist-practitioner (Boulder) model of clinical psychology: I strive for excellence as both a researcher and a clinician. Professionally, my time is split roughly equally between these domains, with additional time ($\sim 20\%$) dedicated to teaching, education and mentorship.

My program of research seeks to move beyond the ubiquitous descriptive study of spirituality/religion (S/R) and mental health by developing and validating explanatory models of why and how both positive and negative facets of S/R can functionally impact symptoms and treatment. While most of my research has been conducted in the Jewish community, I have launched several patient-based studies at McLean Hospital and hope to further develop this line of inquiry over the coming years. I am passionate about my research and bring a high level of energy and creativity to my research. To this end, I have been a principal investigator on 12 studies which have received over \$350,000 in research support (mostly private donations), and served as associate editor for three special issues of peer-reviewed journals on S/R and mental health.

I take a clinical approach to my area of study through the integration of S/R into evidence-based psychosocial treatments. Despite the importance of S/R within the general population – over 92% of Americans believe in God and more than 50% report that religion is "very important" in their lives (Gallup Poll, 2011) – the combined mental health disciplines have shied away from this domain and core competencies in how to address S/R in treatment are lacking. To address this gap, I have authored four treatment programs/manuals describing when/how to utilize patient spirituality in the context of Cognitive Behavioral Therapy. As well, in the past year alone I delivered four, invited national/international lectures and workshops and I am currently working on a book proposal for an academic publisher on this subject matter. I also direct an outpatient clinic in New York City (the Center for Anxiety), which provides spirituallybased CBT to the general public and serves as a private clinical-laboratory for innovation in this area.

I am further committed to teaching and mentorship. While McLean Hospital is not a psychology degree-conferring institution, I have elected to serve on five dissertation committees for students examining S/R issues in mental health at other institutions (two of which are international). In addition, I provide informal clinical and research supervision to roughly 10 students in the New York area, and regularly receive requests for professional development counseling as well (~2 meetings/month). I am also very proud to serve as an invited lecturer, author and media interviewee to the community on issues related to S/R and mental health.

In sum, I feel truly fortunate to have developed both clinical and research expertise in an understudied yet important area, and I hope to build a national and international reputation as a leader and innovator in this field over the course of my career.
